We would like to begin by acknowledging that the land on which we gather, work and learn upon is the unceded territory of the Coast Salish Peoples, including the territories of the xwməθkwəỷəm (Musqueam), Skwxwú7mesh (Squamish), Stó:lō and Səlílwəta?/Selilwitulh (Tsleil- Waututh) Nations. The land has always been a place of learning for the Indigenous peoples, who for millennia have passed on their culture, history, and traditions from one generation to the next. Unceded means that this land was never surrendered, relinquished or handed over in any way.

Land acknowledgment is a part of reconciliation, and as such we give you all the responsibility to continue your self-education by asking questions and learning more about reconciliation. Questions like: What can you do to better care for the land? And Who lived on this land before you?

Land acknowledgment is about reflecting on the places where we reside and work and play, while respecting all peoples and their experiences, but in recognition of the Indigenous traditions and ties to the land.

Land acknowledgment can help build understanding about our relationships and responsibilities to the Indigenous people and lands where we live and work. It is a living celebration of Indigenous communities and relationships, and appreciation for the rich history and culture of the lands where we live and work.

We also invite you all to research what traditional lands you live, work and play in so that you can in your own way give acknowledgment.

You do not need to be present for the whole event. You can come and go as you please and join whichever sessions you want.

4:30-5pm Check-in - Please join a few minutes early to check-in to the event and confirm the sessions you will be attending. This is also a chance to get familiar with the platform and find where you are going, as we will be starting the sessions right on time!

5-6pm Panel Session: Rural rotations and careers

Virtual Venue Tutorial

Our virtual venue is being hosted on a platform called Gather.town. It's like being at a real event, but in a videogame-like format. You will create a character (your "avatar") whose movement you can control; you will walk your avatar to different areas of the virtual space to attend sessions, visit virtual booths, interact with objects (for example: clicking on a TV will show you a video) and video chat with other attendees.

Joining the venue

- This link gives you access to the virtual venue immediately. We recommend checking out the venue ahead of time to familiarize yourself with the platform.
 - If this were an in-person event held at the Convention Centre (for example), this would be like giving you the keys to the Convention Centre ahead of time so you could visit it before the event and get your bearings.
- You **do not** need to sign in or create an account.
- We recommend using a computer to access the virtual venue. You can access it on a mobile device, but it's a bit tricky to move around and view the space.
- To leave the venue, exit the tab on your browser. You can rejoin whenever you want by using the same link above.

Read the instructions below or watch <u>this video</u> to learn how the platform works. ***Disclaimer**: the video is a bit outdated and is missing some of the features described below.

Creating your avatar

When you first click on the link, you will be asked to create an avatar.

- 1. Customize your avatar's appearance by clicking on "edit". **Please observe the following rules**:
 - **No drum accessory**: Exhibitors' avatars will have the drum accessory, so please do not include this on your avatar.
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- **No graduation caps**: Panelists' avatars will be wearing graduation caps, so please do not include this on your avatar.
- No witch hats: The event staff will be wearing witch hats, so please do not include this on your avatar.
- 2. Your name: please enter your name. You do not need to include your last name.
- 3. Click on Join the Gathering when you are done creating your avatar.

Video, audio and one-on-one video chatting

Please allow the platform use of your mic and video.

Important: When your avatar is close to another person's, your audio and video will automatically connect to theirs.

• This means: as long as you both have your camera and microphones on, you will be able to see and hear the attendees whose avatars are near yours, and they will be able to see and hear you.

- We recommend **turning off your camera and microphone** unless you are actively trying to video chat with someone. **Otherwise your audio and video will automatically connect to every user whose avatar is near yours.**
 - **To video chat one-on-one**: move your avatar close to theirs and ensure your mic and camera are on.
 - *We recommend moving to a non-crowded area to avoid other users' audio and video automatically connecting in to your conversation.
 - **To turn your camera and mic off and on**: click on the camera and mic icons on the bottom left of the screen. Green means on, red means off.
- Video view options:
 - View yourself on the bottom left of the screen. You can pin your video using the pin icon.
 - **Video chatting**: Click on the maximize video icon (top right of the screen) to make your video full screen. Click it again to get out of full screen.
 - **Watching panel presentations**: Click on the view icon (top right of screen circled in red in the screenshot below) to choose your view options.
 - Grid view: view yourself and all the speakers side-by-side in full screen mode.
 - Speaker view: enlarges the speakers' videos and minimizes your video in full screen mode.
 - Clicking on Carousel view gets you out of full screen mode, but you will still be able to see the speakers' videos at the top of the screen.

Move your avatar to get to the different event sessions, video chat with other attendees, visit virtual booths, and interact with objects.

- Use the arrow keys on your keyboard to move OR
- Double click with your mouse where you want to go

Zoom in/out by:

- Scrolling with your mouse wheel
 OR
- Pressing Cntrl +/- on your keyboard OR
- Pinch to zoom on laptop mouse trackpads

Interacting with objects

Walk up to an object to interact with it.

For example, if you interact with a TV, it might show you a video.

- Objects will glow yellow when you can interact with them.
- To interact: Press "X" on your keyboard or, if you are on mobile, tap the preview that pops up.
- To stop interacting with the object and return to the room: press the "Esc" key on your keyboard or click (tap if you are on mobile) the "x" button on the top right of the preview.



Event information toolbar

Find event information on the toolbar at the bottom right of the screen:

- Info board: real-time announcements about the event.
- Chat: View/send messages to specific people, people nearby, or to the entire room.
- **People icon**: View all the people at the event. Click on a person's name to send them a message or locate them.
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- **Schedule**: View each of the sessions at the event, including their times and locations. Click on a session's name to view more information about it. The "let's go" button will display a black line that you can follow to get to the session.
